# Expanding Flexibility New Proposing and Observing Modes

## Large and Long Programs

Long and Large Programs now occupy up to 20% of Gemini observing time for the participating partners (United States, Canada, Australia, and Argentina). These programs require significantly more time than is typically approved for a single program, or are extend over two to six semesters, or both. Principal Investigators (PIs) must be based in an institution within one of

the participating partner countries, though there is no restriction on Co-Investigator (Co-I) affiliation.

The annual announcement of opportunity is issued late each year, with Letters of Intent due in early February and proposals due in early April, for observations to begin in the subsequent B This new observing mode allows Pls (or team member) to visit Gemini prepared to observe either their own program, if conditions meet their requirements, or execute approved queue programs, if the conditions are too poor. ### Fast Turnaround Programs

The Fast Turnaround program is now accepting proposals! Most Gemini users can now submit proposals every month, to be reviewed by PIs/Co-Is of other proposals submitted during that round. PIs will be notified of the outcome within 3 weeks and accepted programs will be observed in a "mini-queue" on three dedicated nights each month.
